

Play and stream music



This tutorial will teach you how to stream music and sync your music library with the CloudMe service. Streaming music with CloudMe is easy and fun and enables you to always bring your music with you, even in the car.

The first thing to do in order to play music with CloudMe is to upload some music. This can be done using the web interface or more conveniently, by installing CloudMe on your computer and activate syncing of your music folder. Any folder on your computer with music can be synced to CloudMe.

PLAYING MUSIC

Music can be played from any location in CloudMe, a synced folder, a followed WebShare or directly from your Cloud Drive. Using the mobile application, you can select to play a particular song, or add the entire folder to the play queue. When the last song in the play queue is done, it will start over with the first song. The play queue is shared between the mobile app, the web interface and TV apps. This means that CloudMe will remember the song you played on your phone and allow you to continue and play the same play queue at home. If you are using CloudMe in your car and your car stereo is Bluetooth® capable, you can pair your phone with the stereo and stream directly from CloudMe to your car stereo.



WORKING WITH PLAYLISTS

You may at any time save the current play queue as a *playlist*. The playlist is compatible through our mobile apps, web interface and TV apps. We use the well-known *.m3u* playlist format that most MP3 players support – allowing you to export playlists created in CloudMe to be used by your favourite player on your computer. Remember to make sure the relative paths to songs are the same as the folders you have set up in CloudMe. This is easiest done by syncing your entire music collection.

→ *Use the web interface to quickly create playlists, or if you have synced your entire music folder, use a software like WinAmp or Windows Media Player to create a .m3u playlist, to play on your phone*

ACTIVATE SYNCING OF MUSIC

When you use CloudMe you will notice some default synced folders like *Music*, *Movies* and *Videos*. These folders are also available as shortcuts on the *Home*-tab. If you install CloudMe on your computer, you will find the *Music* folder already present under the *Synced*-tab, however it is inactive and needs to be activated. By activating one of the default folders, you are asked to specify where your corresponding folder is located on your computer. The contents of your music folder will then begin to sync with CloudMe and become available in your phone, tablet and TV. Any meta data about a song like artist, album, song name, length etc will be automatically extracted by CloudMe and become searchable. You may also sync the music folder across multiple computers in your home.
